

Become Fishers of People Message by Pastor Tamie, 1/24/21 [Scripture: Mark 1:14-20]

The buzzer rang on the church door one afternoon. As I opened the door, I was greeted by a man who immediately launched into a story before I could invite him inside the building. He explained that he had lost his job, fallen into some hard times, and his water had been shut off. So as I invited him in. assuming that he was in need of money to pay his bill, he stopped me. He asked for water. I assured him that we could offer him water while we talked. He stopped me again. He went around the corner of the building and returned wheeling buckets. I am certain my mouth dropped open; I was so surprised. He didn't want money; he needed water. He was all so unexpected. We went to the maintenance closet where he could fill up the large buckets with water. Meanwhile he shared his story, where he had been and where he was going. We hoped together for a better tomorrow. As he rolled his buckets of water down the street. I had to remind myself of the beauty and courage of people, of how I need to see and welcome each person as Christ himself.

It's a normal part of church life, strangers knocking on the door in need of assistance with housing or food or clothing. The very nature of Church calls us to be a safe place of compassion and kindness. What I've discovered is this: the most important thing anyone needs, struggling or not, is a friend, someone to navigate life with. Whether you are sharing some buckets of water or greeting a person in the grocery store, the real moment is when you pause, see the person, and offer your presence of love. In these moments of authentic relationship, everyone is transformed. I've since come to expect the "all so unexpected" in my encounters with people.

In our reading this morning, we encounter an "all so unexpected" man named Jesus. Jesus arrives out of the throes of the wilderness crying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news" (Mark 1:15). The previous text, in a mere five lines, describes the baptism of Jesus, the powerful force of the Spirit, and his life altering, forty-day encounter with God in the wilderness. What we know from the teaching that follows is Jesus experienced profound Universal Love. This Universal Love becomes the lens through which Jesus views the world; with God as his center point, Jesus lives and teaches with a new clarity, profound compassion, and authority. As a result, he chooses to inaugurate a new family that lives to express such inward love outwardly toward all people. For Jesus, in this new social order he refers to as the Kingdom of God, loving God is equivalent to loving humans. And so we discover the gentle, compassionate spirit of a man who travels the land of Israel, healing, teaching, and loving all of humanity in a profound way. Through this way of love, the Kingdom of God becomes fully present. In just a few lines, the Gospel of Mark defines the bedrock on which Jesus constructs the Kingdom of God. This message about the Kingdom of God is linked to the call, "Follow me!" ~Message cont'd on pg. 3

Eligible students can learn more and apply at www.bccf.org from January 1st though March 31st. Loans are available to active members of Calvary UMC, Mohnton, in pursing some form of postsecondary education. Calvary membership must have been for at least one year to qualify. Members must be attending a 2 or 4-year college or vocational school either full or PT or pursuing some type of post-secondary education through a certification program. A typical translation of today's scripture reads, "Follow me, and I will make you fish for people." That's how I had always learned it, "fish for people," as if it was something to do. The better translation, though, interprets this call of fishing for people as a new identity. It literally says in Greek, "Follow me, and I will make you to become fishers for people." This call is not an addendum to a job description; it's not one more thing to do. Leslie Hoppe eloquently explains, "Jesus' mission was to call people to repentance, that is, a total reorientation of their lives so that they will be in a position to accept God's sovereign rule authentically" (Feasting on the Word: Year B, Volume 1, 287). Followers of Christ embody a new identity. They become fishers for people.

Fishers for people drop their nets. This is a shedding of identity, especially in a culture where identity is assumed according to the trade of your family. As a follower of Jesus, there is nothing more important in life than people and impacting the lives of people. Jesus makes it clear from the very beginning, that this work is a people business. Followers of Jesus are called to get caught up with people, loving them just as they are and becoming a companion that leads to healing and justice. Notice that the fishermen leave their nets behind; they aren't hauling in a catch. Jesus begins and ends with twelve disciples. As fishers for people, our role is not to fill pews or engage in church growth initiatives. The intent is not to collect people but to unconditionally share love, joy, peace, and hope in the broken world through acts of compassion and mercy.

At the age of six, Emory professor, Dr. Gregory Ellison II, asked his aunt how he might change the world. She responded, saying, "Baby, I don't know how you can change the world, but you can change the three feet around you." His aunt's words of wisdom transformed into a spiritual way of living he calls the three-feet practice. Dr. Ellison explains that in this daily spiritual practice, he is intentional about seeing the people around him and hearing their stories. This faith practice reflects his commitment to welcoming the stranger and taking time to connect with others. He recognizes that there are people who live feeling like they are hidden in plain view. By intentionally focusing on the people who enter his three-foot space and engaging with them, Dr. Ellison asserts that his living, loving presence by just listening saves lives. People feel heard, valued, and affirmed. At the same time, it lessens the fear of strangers that is so much a part of our culture. In the video, Reverend Dotson was explicit, "Discipleship begins with relationship. We cannot disciple people who we are not in relationship with." The radical, universal love which Jesus shares is rooted in a compassion and mercy only possible when you see every person with dignity and open your heart to authentic relationships with them. I believe that there are no accidents. I believe that the people who enter your personal circle are there for a reason. Everywhere we go, with everyone we meet, we are called to become fishers for people...to

love people radically.


Fishers for people walk away from their boats and the fish in the sea and even their families. Priorities change. You are no longer called to a private salvation but to a public vocation. Jesus did not gather these fishers for people to study together and care for their families and friends. Jesus' call moves you out of the center of your circle and into a mobile community where God's grace grounds you to be a source of love in a widening circle that reaches to the ends of the earth.

Hunter Doherty "Patch" Adams is a doctor by trade, but if you ask him, he'll tell you above all else he considers himself an activist for peace, justice and care for all people. You may know a little about his life from the movie Patch Adams with Robin Williams playing the doctor who wore a red clown nose. After being hospitalized because he didn't want to live in a world with so much violence and injustice, Patch decided instead to engage the world as a happy soul. He began clowning in public. Then Patch studied medicine to become a doctor. Along the way, he challenged the sterile, institutional practices of medicine. He focused on fostering relationships with all people, with connections that brought joy and laughter. Patch envisioned and created the Gesundheit Institute, a communal ecovillage hospital that provided free medical care. His unorthodox approaches of healing almost stopped him from finishing medical school. Patch recognized that healing required more than medicine; healing was relational. Today, while he continues to pursue this dream of a crazy free hospital, he travels the world on clown trips, reaching all corners of the world - in war zones, refugee camps, natural disaster sites. He asserts, "My life has been a dance with humanity. Friends are my passion" (https://www.patchadams.org/patchadams/). Patch Adams embodies the radical life of a fisher for people.

The gentleman who had wheeled his water down the street returned when he received notification of a job interview. He was so excited to share the opportunity. If he could get to the interview, he could secure himself a full-time position. He lacked the resources to pay for the public transportation. So he returned to a place where he had experienced hospitality, where he had been seen and invited in, where someone listened to his story. Someone had encouraged him in his struggles and allowed him to drink from the well. I was blessed to share in this difficult part of his life journey and celebrate his moment of success. If I had simply paid for a water bill, the outcome would have been different. Our lives would not have intersected so beautifully.

Do you "see the people" around you and offer something more than a transaction? Do you intentionally seek to engage in relational interactions with all people: friends, neighbors, and strangers; those who are like you and those who are different; those nearby and those who live in places to which you must choose to go? Jesus proclaims, "Follow me, and I will make you to become fishers for people." Become is a really important word. Following Jesus is not a one-time choice; it is a lifelong journey. We must nurture this

longstanding commitment in Christ. Let us join together - whether committing for the first time or renewing your commitment - to become fishers for people, followers of Jesus the Christ:

DISMANTLING RACISM WORKSHOPS GENERAL INFORMATION:

This is a 3 day workshop and participation all 3 days is expected. Participants will learn concrete strategies for:

- Developing skills for addressing and changing attitudes and behaviors that perpetuate bias, discrimination, and other obstacles to equity
- Recognizing institutional racism and other forms of systemic oppression and discrimination that affect members of historically excluded groups
- Changing dysfunctional intraracial and interracial behavior that undermine effective partnerships
- Learning to acknowledge and interrupt the subtle (and often unintentional) dynamics that play out between "modern" forms of oppression and "internalized oppression".
