5th Sunday in Lent ~ Sermon: Worship as Spiritual Discipline TEXT: 1 Corinthians 10:31-33

There is a story about a Christian woman who was taking care of a young non-Christian girl while the girl's parents were away on business. The little girl asked one Sunday if she could go to church with the woman and her husband. When the church service was over, the couple wanted to know how the little girl liked the experience. She said that she liked it, but one thing confused her. She told them that she didn't know why they did not include the West Coast in their **worship**. They asked her what she meant. She answered, "You know, when you say...'in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the whole East Coast.'

Often, people have "favorite" worship services, such as Christmas Eve, Easter, worship on mission trips, youth services, and so on and so forth.

WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE CHURCH/WORSHIP SERVICE?

What is worship?

We can find the word worship from the first book of the Bible, Genesis, to the last book of the Bible, Revelation. **It was mentioned 172X.** Worship begins with God reaching out to us, and we respond to God, our Creator, for what God has done, is doing, and will do in, to, and through our lives. God is constantly reaching out to have a relationship with us through worship.

In the Old Testament, worship translates to the Hebrew verb "shachah" (shawkhaw), meaning to bow down, crouch, fall down, stoop, prostrate oneself, in homage to royalty or God. In the New Testament, it comes from the Greek word "latreia", which also means bow down, adoration, devotion, and cult, whereas the word cultivates came from, meaning to develop. However, in the year 1970, the word cult had a negative connotation—meaning a religious group with extreme and strange beliefs.

Worship in the Old Testament involves prayer, gathering, reading of the scripture, sacrifices which involve the blood of animals, offerings, and donations of a tenth of their produce. It is mostly physical in nature. In the New Testament, worship also involves prayer, gathering, reading of the scripture, offering, and donations. However, we don't make sacrifices anymore because Jesus, the Son of God, gave himself to be the atoning sacrifice for the forgiveness of our sins, bridging the separation between a Holy God and sinful humanity. Instead, we celebrate the Holy Communion as a remembrance of what Jesus did on the cross. There is no heavy sin that Jesus could not carry.

Jesus said in John 4:23-24 (NIV): "But the hour is coming, and is now here, when the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth, for the Father is seeking such people to worship him. ²⁴ God is spirit, and those who worship him must worship in spirit and truth."

3 Important Things about Worship

- 1. Worship is directed to God:
- 2. Worship is for the glory of God; and,
- 3. Worship brings us to the presence of God.

1. Worship is directed to God.

Verse 31 of today's scripture tells us that no matter what we do--whether we are living or breathing, eating or drinking, whatever we do-- we should do it for God, to give glory and show gratitude. This opens up the possibility and freedom of all sorts of regular daily activities, becoming acts of worship. The point is not to diminish the importance of worshipping in church or other traditional ways but to expand worship into a way of life, including and yet going beyond worship as we often think of it. Acknowledge God's work and hands in everything. We should be talking to, thinking about, and directing all our energy to God.

After attending church one Sunday morning, a little boy knelt at his bedside that night and prayed, "Dear God, we had a good time at church today, but I wish you had been there!". This boy had a great time at church, but his young mind does not yet understand the presence of God in every worship and the focus on God a is we worship. Church is fun because God is there.

2. Worship is for the glory of God.

There are no real standards for "how" to worship--no prescriptions on how many prayers need to be said, how many verses of the hymns need to be sung, or what hymnal they must be sung. Worship starts with the intention that everything that is done in a day is done to give glory to God. It is important that we remember that God does not require a specific bulletin or that there's a particular order of worship that most pleases God, but our worship, both public and private, should be done with the intention of bringing glory to God. It is not about perfection; it is about living our lives as disciples.

In the context of this passage, the apostle Paul encourages the Corinthians to be thoughtful about what

they choose to do or not do in the company of other people, especially non-Christians, so that God is glorified by the way they interact with others and so that they do not hurt or harm others.

3. Worship brings us into the presence of God.

Oftentimes, we restrict/confine God to a building, a service, or a gathering, or even think of God only every Sunday or when we pray. God is present in our lives; God is Emanuel, so if we are doing things for God, we are entering into a sacred space of worship and God is there. If we are helping somebody carry their things, that is an act of worship; if we laugh with our friends, that is an act of worship. As long as we glorify God in everything we do, we are entering into God's grace, and that is worship.

In Copenhagen, Denmark, there is a beautiful 11 ft. statue called "The Christus." Completed in 1833 by Danish sculptor, Bertel Thorvalsden, this marble interpretation of Christ is one of the world's masterpieces of sculpting art. The inscription at the base of the sculpture reads "Kommer til mig" ("Come to me") with a reference to the Bible verse Matthew 11:28: "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." Jesus is depicted with his hands spread, displaying the wounds in the hands of his resurrected body.

It is said that when the statue was first shown, there was dismay among some who viewed it. Somehow, something about it seemed not quite right; it was as though some essential quality was not there. Then Thorvalsden explained: You cannot see His face unless you kneel at His feet. And so it was, and so it is: the statue is so artfully designed that, really, to see it, one must kneel and look up. It's full beauty and impact cannot be seen by merely walking by. So it is with our life: many things call for more than a passing glance. One does not get a disciple's feel for Christ by casually strolling by. We must take our time and dedicate it to God. Thus, we worship. We need it — a time to pause and ponder in everything we do, to direct our eyes and humble ourselves to kneel and look up. Then and only then, we see God's face, while in an intentional attitude of worship

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen
