

In an effort to keep our congregation informed about finances within Calvary church we would like to provide this update.

**Parsonage Project:** The parsonage attic insulation installation has been completed.

### **Church Budget:**

As of August 31st, we are currently 11% behind in the giving needed (YTD) to meet our budget requirements. As often happens, we experienced a downturn financially during the summer months, so, our current situation is still a bit concerning. We are initiating a voluntary stewardship experiment to help solve the problem.

### **SUNNY DAY FUND UPDATE**

Hopefully by now, everyone knows about the P.R.I.S.M. team's Sunny Day Fund. If not, here's a quick review. From now until Dec 1, (or longer if you prefer) keep track of the money you spend just to treat yourself i.e. going out to eat, going to the movies, vacationing, etc. Set aside 10% as thanksgiving for your good fortune and bring that amount to church on Dec 1, the Sunday after Thanksgiving. ### **DAVE**

He was born during World War II while his father was serving as a Marine in the Pacific. He had been too young to remember his mother's grief when his father's body was returned to be buried in a military cemetery in 1946, but he was never allowed to forget his father's military service. His mother had kept a journal during the war, documenting her husband's assignments. She kept his letters, displayed his medals and had scores of photos. To put it mildly, he grew up in his father's shadow.

He never really forgave his mother when she remarried. To his young mind, it was a betrayal of his hero. His stepfather had been a good man who tried very hard to relate to the boy, but he was never able to penetrate the wall of isolation.

He did well in high school, graduating near the top of his class, but there was no money for college. His fallback option was the Marine Corps. He completed boot camp and tech school just in time for the Vietnam War.

During the early Marine years, he fell in love and entered the first of two disastrous marriages. Before he left for his first deployment to "Nam", his wife was pregnant. A boy would be born before he returned and the marriage would end in less than two years. Another marriage several years later repeated the same violent history. His Marine career ended abruptly after repeated problems with discipline. He was fortunate to receive an honorable discharge.

When I met him on our admissions ward, he was an angry, belligerent, rebellious, young man who wanted nothing to do with anyone wearing a white collar. He called us "Holy Joes".

He arrived early in the summer and, since he was not psychotic, he was soon transferred to an open ward. Frequently, I saw him walking alone on the campus. One day, he was sitting on a bench near our new chapel, and I asked if I could sit down. Neither of us spoke for several minutes and then, to my surprise, he said, "I'm sorry for the way I greeted you a few weeks ago." We talked for quite a while that day and he told me much of what I have written in the early paragraphs of this story.

It took time, but it was the beginning of a friendship. He began to stop by the office every day or two. I soon discovered that behind the angry façade that pushed

people away was a fatherless boy, ashamed of his failures as a husband and a Marine. He needed to remove the bitter wall of resentment and distrust and find ways to connect with people.

He began, tentatively at first, to attend a small group that met in the chapel on Tuesday evening after an informal service conducted, in part, by volunteers. Slowly at first, he came from behind his defensive wall and began to participate in the discussion. He discovered that other vets had stories similar to his own. After a few weeks, I began to see him walking and talking with others on campus. One day in my office he said, "Chap, if you are sure the roof won't fall on me, I think I would like to come to chapel this Sunday." And he did.

During the remainder of his hospital stay, we had frequent serious discussions. He questioned the injustices in the world, war, violence, poverty, and hypocrisy. I know that all of his questions did not find answers, but he came out of his shell and the wall of isolation came down.

In late summer of the next year, I was present when he met with the staff prior to discharge. With help from the social worker, he was registered at a community college and would receive funds under the G.I. Bill. All his issues were not resolved. There were scars that might never heal, but he had developed confidence in himself and the ability to reach out to others. Only a little of the wall of isolation remained. To those of us present at the staff meeting, he again seemed ready to face the world.

Later that day, when I returned to the chapel, my secretary told me that something had been left on my desk. More than forty years later, I still have that gift. In fact, it motivated this story. It is a hand tooled leather Bible cover. On the front are a cross and my initials. On the back are hands held as though in prayer. But, inside the cover are the words that prompted me to write this story. They are: "To the best friend I ever had", Dave.
