Come to the Table, Week #1 Revelation @ the Table

10/06/24/24 Pastor Nova's: Scripture: Luke 24:28-35

When we are invited to share a meal, many emotions can be stirred: gratitude, warmth, joy, and a sense of connection. Reflect on the last time you felt these emotions. Was it at a family gathering, a wedding, or a community meal?

Have you ever thought about the Bible passage that inspired the design of the stained-glass window? I believe the founders of Calvary prayed and thought about it for a long time and came up with a good scripture which is the text for our New Series: COME TO THE TABLE, Luke 24:28-35.

Today, we are focusing on a powerful moment in the Gospel of Luke, on the day of the resurrection, where two disciples, on their way to Jerusalem, encounter Jesus on the road to Emmaus. It's this journey that led to the Revelation at the Table. 3 Important Revelations: Place of presence, encounter, and mission.

A famous phrase by Mary Barrett is *Christ is the head of the home, the unseen guest of every meal, the silent listener to every conversation.*

#1 The Table is a Place of Divine Presence

In Luke 24:28-29, as the disciples approached the village, they urged the stranger walking with them to stay, saying, "Stay with us, for it is nearly evening; the day is almost over." They sensed something different about Him and wanted His presence to remain with them, even though they hadn't yet recognized Him as Jesus. At the table as they ate, in their time of grief and desperation, Jesus was there.

Like the disciples, we often encounter Jesus when we invite Him to linger in our lives. We invite Christ to dwell with us when we make space for Him in our daily lives, especially in moments of fellowship and communion. Sermon *cont'd* on pg. 3



The Mohnton Community Thanksgiving Eve worship service will be hosted by Calvary UMC on SUNDAY, November 24th, at 4:00PM.

SAFE BERKS held its Silent Witness Walk on Monday. October 14. The procession of one hundred and fifty walkers started at the shelter on Chestnut Street and wound its way around downtown Reading for 40 minutes before ending at the Miller Center. Many walkers carried a red silhouette, symbolizing Berks County's victims of domestic violence homicide. Each silhouette displayed a shield with their name and untimely death. Before 1999, there was no record of deaths from domestic violence. Since then, there have been 86 known victims; men, women, children, and pets. One lone purple silhouette symbolized the uncounted victims of the past. It is a powerful event to witness, as family and friends honor their loved ones in this silent way.

Even more moving, are the stories told by survivors. At the Dedication Ceremony that followed the walk, families shared their tragic losses. One young teenager remembered her mother, who had been shot by the father right before her eyes six years ago. It is difficult to imagine living with that trauma. The overarching mission of SAFE BERKS is to prevent any more heartbreaking tragedies.

A big thank you to Sandy Graffius for supporting the event with her presence at the Dedication Ceremony and to my husband for accompanying me on the walk. I hope to see more Calvary members at future events.

The table is not just a physical space but a spiritual one where Jesus meets us in our need and reveals Himself to us.

Have you invited Jesus to dwell in the moments that seem ordinary? In the rush of life, are you making time to invite His presence to stay? Let us remember that God's presence is not limited to grand moments but is often revealed in simple acts of hospitality and fellowship.

The table is a sacred place where we encounter the divine. Just as the disciples urged the stranger (Jesus) to stay with them, we too invite Christ's presence into our lives

#2 The Table is a Place of Encounter In Luke 24:30-31, it says, "When He was at the table with them, He took bread, gave thanks, broke it, and

began to give it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized Him."

There's something sacred that happens at the table. In this moment, the disciples' eyes were opened, and they suddenly realized that the

stranger with them was Jesus. The act of breaking bread, reminiscent of the Last Supper, became the moment of revelation. This tells us that the table is not only a place of fellowship but also a place where spiritual truths are unveiled.

The disciples had been walking with Jesus, but they didn't see Him for who He was until they sat down at the table. Sometimes, we don't fully understand what God is doing in our lives until we take time to sit in His presence, reflect, and break bread together in community.

In our lives, we often struggle to recognize God in the midst of our journey. But when we come to the table — to prayer, to worship, to communion — God opens our eyes. Are we prepared for those moments of revelation, or are we too distracted to see? Let us be expectant that when we come to the table,

God will reveal His heart, His will, and His presence to us in new ways.

#3 The Table is a Place of Mission

After their eyes were opened and they recognized Jesus, what did the disciples do? Luke 24:33 says, "They got up and returned at once to Jerusalem. There they found the Eleven and those with them, assembled together ³⁴ and saying, "It is true! The Lord has risen and has appeared to Simon." ~Sermon *cont'd on pg. 5*

THE VOLUNTEER

In the early 1960's, our hospital had no chapel building; the patient population was nearly two thousand and virtually every door was locked. Patients had little privacy and many, if not most, remained in the hospital for extended periods of time. I shared my work with one other protestant chaplain who was approaching seventy years of age. He was a kind and good man who no longer had the health and energy of earlier years. As a result, I found myself conducting thirteen informal ward services each week, along with a busy schedule of visitation and counseling. Needless to say, I needed help.

One day, early in my tenure, I received a strange phone call. The man told me that he wanted to work as a volunteer at the hospital. He said that he was a businessman and active churchman. He played guitar and sang and could assist in religious services. Then, the phone conversation took a strange turn. It seemed as though he was trying to give me reasons to turn down his offer. He said that he was a pacifist and conscientious objector to military service. He had actively demonstrated against the wars in Vietnam and Korea.

Our phone conversation was lengthy and led to a personal visit, a tour of the hospital and our decision to give the relationship a try. He became one of the best volunteers I ever knew and my good friend.

I was to learn that he had a degree in industrial design and owned half interest in the New England Clock Company. One of his early jobs had been as a member of the General Motors team that designed the classic 1955 Chevrolet. He flew his own plane from a nearby private airstrip, commuting to his company headquarters in Connecticut. Always, on Tuesday, he would arrange his busy schedule so that he could assist at several ward services in the evening.

Never did this sensitive man inject his personal political views into this work as a volunteer. He understood the stress and trauma already experienced by many of the veterans and was careful not to add to their problems. His guitar and soothing baritone voice became a familiar part of the evening services and patients saw him as a personal friend.

In the late 1960's, we finally had a chapel building, and the introduction of new medications had revolutionized treatment. Few ward doors were locked and many group activities and programs took place in the chapel. Magnus, that was his name, continued active participation in

discussion groups and services. Frequently, after these activities ended, Magnus would stay on, talking with one or more veterans in a quiet corner of the chapel, discussing some important issue in their lives. He became a father figure to many younger veterans recently returned from Vietnam.

One of his favorite benevolences was to see that discharged vets left the hospital with new clothing and a suitcase. This was always done quietly and without fanfare. He would take the vet shopping and to dinner at a good restaurant. Such afternoons became almost a ritual for vets who knew Magnus. With his contacts in the business community, he often was able to assist in the search for employment.

He told me that he recognized the overwhelming needs across the world in far-away places, but felt that his mission was to do what he could to address the needs close to home.

Several years before I retired, Magnus suffered the first of several strokes that finally would take his life. Along with several of his friends from the hospital, I attended the graveside service in a quiet rural cemetery not far from his home. By many of us, he will always be remembered not as a talented industrial designer and entrepreneur, but as a Christian layman who quietly used his talent, time and resources to give aid and comfort to veterans who had experienced the violence and trauma of war.

Many years ago, a man named, Edgar Guest, wrote a poem with the opening line, "I'd rather see a sermon than hear one any day." My old friend, Magnus, was a living example of those words.

Do we know what it meant to go back to Jerusalem? The journey back to Jerusalem meant going back to the place of danger. Returning to Jerusalem after recognizing Jesus was a bold move, considering the recent events surrounding Jesus' crucifixion. Jerusalem was a dangerous place for Jesus' followers. And yet it symbolized a spiritual breakthrough.

Their walk to Emmaus was filled with doubt, grief, and confusion. But after recognizing Jesus in the breaking of bread, their faith was renewed. V33 - They got up and returned at once to Jerusalem -sense of urgency. Going back to Jerusalem also signified the disciples' understanding of their mission. The city symbolized the center of God's redemptive plan and the place where the gospel would first be proclaimed. It meant they were now ready to join the other disciples and declare the truth of the resurrection. Their return was a sign of restored faith and conviction in the success of God's plan, despite the circumstances.

The table not only opens our eyes to who Jesus is but also sends us out with a mission. When we encounter Jesus at the table, we are called to share that encounter with others. The revelation of Christ compels us to return to our communities and testify about what He has done.

The Table Is a Place of Revelation

The passage also highlights the importance of understanding the Old Testament in light of Jesus' death and resurrection. Jesus' explanation of Scripture from Moses and the Prophets shows how all of Scripture points to His redemptive work.

In the story of Genesis, when Adam and Eve ate the forbidden fruit, their eyes were opened to their nakedness, marking the fall of humankind. Now, in this moment on the road to Emmaus, as the two disciples ate with Jesus, their eyes were opened to the presence of God. This was a moment of cosmic healing, redemption, and restoration—a powerful revelation of God's unwavering love and salvation

In this story from Luke, the table becomes a place of Divine presence, Encounter and Mission. When we invite Jesus to the table of our lives, we can encounter Him in profound ways. We experience His presence as we fellowship with Him and others, we receive revelation as He opens our eyes to spiritual truths, and we are sent on a mission to share the good news of what He has done in our lives.

So today, I encourage you: *Come to the table.* Whether it's in prayer, in communion, or in fellowship with others, expect Jesus to meet you there. And when He does, let that encounter propel you into the world, ready to share His love and grace with others.

Friends, after hearing God's word, what are you going to do with it? In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Come to the Table: Guess Who's Coming to Dinner?

10/13/24 Sermon by Pastor Nova; Scripture: Luke 14:12-14

When was the last time you invited someone to your table with no expectation of anything in return? How did you think that experience impact you or them?

Radical Hospitality and Kingdom Generosity

In Luke 14:12-14, we find Jesus at the home of a Pharisee, engaging in a meal that was typical of the cultural practices of the time. Hosting a luncheon or dinner in the ancient Near East was more than just a social event; it was an important opportunity to display wealth, reinforce social ties, and elevate one's status. Hospitality was considered a virtue, but often, it came with an expectation—reciprocal hospitality.

In this context, the idea of reciprocal hospitality means that if someone invites you to their table, it's expected that you will return the favor. The social gatherings of the time were not purely for connection or kindness but rather a means to maintain or elevate one's social standing. Jesus,

however, challenges this cultural norm, calling us to a deeper, more selfless expression of generosity.

Three Important Teachings of Jesus

1. Hospitality with Hidden Motives

In verse 12, Jesus addresses the typical approach to hospitality. People often invite friends, relatives, or wealthy neighbors, expecting to be invited back. This reciprocal exchange creates a cycle that benefits both parties and maintains the balance of social standing. In our own time, we often fall into similar patterns. We may help or serve others with an unspoken expectation of receiving something in return, whether it's a favor, recognition, or praise. Jesus challenges this kind of conditional giving, encouraging us instead to practice generosity that expects nothing in return.

A businessman once regularly hosted lavish dinners for his wealthy clients and colleagues, believing that by doing so, he was building strong networks that would benefit his career. However, he realized that while he was generous to those who could help him, he rarely extended that hospitality to people who couldn't repay him, like his office janitors or struggling neighbors.

Are we, like this businessman, generous only when it benefits us? Jesus challenges us to give without expecting anything in return. True generosity doesn't seek repayment; it reflects the unconditional love and grace that God extends to us.

2. Radical Generosity

In verse 13, Jesus turns cultural expectations upside down. He instructs His host to invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind—those who cannot repay him. These are the marginalized members of society, often overlooked and forgotten.

There's a story of a woman named Emily who hosted a Thanksgiving dinner every year for her family and friends. One year, feeling a nudge from God, she decided to invite people from the local homeless shelter instead. She prepared the same feast she would for her family, but this time, the table was filled with strangers who hadn't experienced a home-cooked meal in months. They couldn't repay her, but the joy she saw in their eyes made it the most meaningful Thanksgiving she had ever celebrated.

This kind of radical generosity—giving without expectation—is what Jesus calls us to. Are we reaching out to those on the fringes of society? This type of generosity might seem uncomfortable at first, but the joy and fulfillment it brings is priceless.

3. The Blessing of Kingdom Hospitality

Finally, in verse 14, Jesus assures us that while the marginalized may not be able to repay us, there is a greater reward waiting at the "resurrection of the righteous." The blessings of this kind of hospitality are not measured in earthly terms but in eternal rewards.


A retired man named Mr. James exemplified this kind of hospitality. Every Sunday after church, he would invite new people, the elderly, or those who seemed lonely, to lunch. One young woman, new to the town and feeling isolated, was deeply touched by his invitation. Though she couldn't repay him, she never forgot his kindness. Mr. James didn't need repayment because he understood that his kindness was storing up treasures in heaven.

When we open our hearts and homes to those who cannot repay us, we receive blessings that go beyond this world. Jesus promises that such kindness will be rewarded in eternity, aligning our hearts with the values of the Kingdom of God.

The Call to True Hospitality

Jesus' teaching challenges us to go beyond familiar patterns of giving and receiving. He calls us to practice hospitality that reflects God's heart—inviting those who cannot repay us, giving freely, and serving others without expectation. In doing so, we mirror the grace and mercy that God has so freely given to us.

Friends, as we reflect on God's word today, how will we respond? What are we going to do about it? How will we extend radical hospitality and generosity in our lives? In the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Amen.
