Deck the Halls with HOPE

Unlike many traditional Christmas carols, Deck the Halls is secular. It focuses on decorating, feasting, and general merriment rather than explicitly religious themes. But as we consider decking the halls of our homes, what about decking the halls of our hearts—with hope? HOPE is the first candle of Advent.

What is Hope?

Hope is a feeling of expectation and desire for a certain outcome or something good to happen in the future. It's often tied to optimism, resilience, and the belief that circumstances can improve.

Biblically, hope is more than wishful thinking—it is the confident expectation of what God has promised, rooted in His faithfulness.

- Romans 15:13: "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in Him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit."
- Hope is a forward-looking perspective that sustains us in difficult times, giving us strength and motivation.

Is Hope the Same as Faith?

While hope and faith are closely related, they are not the same.

- Faith is about trust and belief in something or someone. It is a present reality and often more action oriented. Biblically, faith is described as "confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see" (Hebrews 11:1). Faith rests on the promises of God and His character, enabling us to act on them now.
- 2. Hope, on the other hand, is more future-oriented. It is the expectation that those promises will come to fruition, often sustaining faith when circumstances seem bleak.

Analogy:

- Faith is like planting a seed, trusting it will grow because you believe in the process of nature (or God's promise).
- Hope is looking forward to the day when the tree bears fruit, even while waiting through the seasons.







THE BRAILLE WRITER

Ray arrived in our little village of Pittstown, NY in the late 1930's. He had married Mary Baker, a young woman who had grown up in the home of her grandparents in the village.

Ray and Mary immediately became involved in the church, he as a Sunday school teacher and both of them as counselors of our Youth Fellowship. I well remember many winter evenings when a dozen or more of us would gather in the large living room of their home in front of a blazing fire. Several of us, including one or two of the girls, would soon find ourselves in uniform. Ray and Mary were sensitive, wise counselors not far beyond us in years. They never restricted our discussions, even when they involved subjects that our parents were careful to avoid.

I had not thought of this fine young couple in many years. Several weeks ago, a discussion with my daughter-in-law, Donna, rekindled the memories. Donna has devoted her life to teaching children with special needs. She told me about a girl who is both blind and autistic. In order to help this girl, Donna has had to learn Braille. When she mentioned using a Braille writer, memories came flooding back.

Ray Lavender had been working on the development of a compact, affordable Braille writer since the age of twelve, when he produced his first working model. That model is now on display in the Library of Congress.

Ray had graduated from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute (RPI) in Troy, NY only a short time before moving to our village. He was hard at work on a Braille writer that could be mass-produced at a reasonable price. His work was being financed by The American Printing House for the Blind in New York City. Ray's eyesight was not good. He wore very thick glasses. Reading gauges and dials in his shop was difficult. One day, he asked me and another young man, George Borter, if we would be interested in helping in the shop.

George and I would spend evenings both learning and doing. Ray taught us how to produce parts for the Braille writer on a metal lathe and milling machine. In a sense, we became his eyes. He taught us to read blueprints and use them to make parts and assemble models of the Braille writer.

I remember the thrill of visiting the offices of The American Printing House for the Blind in New York. Ray took us there on several occasions when he demonstrated each new model.

Then, abruptly, World War II intervened. George and I enlisted. Ray's eyes prevented military service, but he became part of the war effort in other ways. My son, Peter, found a record stating that, in 1943, Ray Lavender installed the first radar system aboard a U.S. Navy vessel, the carrier, Enterprise.

After the war, in 1950, Ray continued where he left off and, in 1962, a plastic version of the Lavender Braille Writer went into production. It was manufactured until 1982. Peter also found photos of the writer on the American Printing House for the Blind Museum website and, sure enough, it looks very much like the demonstration models I made parts for so many years ago.

I have no information on Ray Lavender's later life, but I am certain that his brilliant, creative mind did not remain idle for even a moment.

Ray's father was an ordained minister in Troy Conference of the Methodist Church. Lavender's bookstore was well known in the city of Troy for many years. Ray's life was strongly influenced by his religious background. Development of the Braille writer was his way of using his talent and training to make life better for those less fortunate.

Faith is believing in the promise now. Hope is looking forward to its fulfillment. Both are essential to a vibrant Christian life (1 Corinthians 13:13). Faith and hope work together, grounded in love, to sustain our journey with God.

Connecting Deck the Halls and Hope

Isaiah 9:2-7 speaks to a hope greater than any holiday tradition. This hope is firmly established in the promises of God, upheld by His unwavering faithfulness.

3 Ways to Deck the Halls with Hope

1. Deck the Halls with Hope in the Promise of God

- Isaiah 9:2: "The people walking in darkness have seen a great light."
- During Isaiah's time, the Israelites faced darkness and oppression. God promised a light—a Savior to bring deliverance and peace.

Our Hope:

 Just as God promised a Messiah to Israel, His promises remain true for us today. • In moments of uncertainty, God's faithfulness gives us assurance and liberation.

Challenge:

What promises of God are you holding onto during this season?

 Personal struggles, health issues, relationships, financial concerns, spiritual challenges, or societal pressures.

Deck your heart with hope by standing on His Word.

2. Deck the Halls with Hope in the Person of Jesus

- Isaiah 9:6: "For unto us a child is born, to us a son is given."
- Messianic Fulfillment: This prophecy points to Jesus as the "Wonderful Counselor," "Mighty God," "Everlasting Father," and "Prince of Peace."

Jesus' Impact:

- He brought light to a world in darkness, healing, peace, and redemption.
- His presence inspires hope amid life's chaos.

Reflection:

Who is Jesus in your life? How does He inspire hope, even in difficult times?

3. Deck the Halls with Hope in Promoting the Gift

• Isaiah 9:7: "Of the greatness of his government and peace, there will be no end."

Our Call:

- Like Judah, our world needs hope. We are called to share Christ's light in the darkness.
- Your story of hope can inspire others to find assurance in God's promises.

Challenge:

How can you be a beacon of hope this season? Through:

- Acts of kindness
- Words of encouragement
- Sharing Jesus' story

Deck someone else's life with hope by pointing them to the Prince of Peace.

As we prepare for Christmas, let's focus on hope:

1. **Hope in the Promise:** Trusting God's plan even when we can't see the outcome.

- 2. **Hope in the Person:** Celebrating Jesus as the light in our darkness.
- 3. **Hope in Promoting the Gift:** Sharing Christ's hope with the world.

This Advent season, may we live confidently in God's faithfulness, sharing His hope with others. Let us declare with joy:

"Unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given!" Our Living Hope.

In the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Amen.
