1st Sunday in Lent- Questions from God: Who is God? | TEXT: 1 John 4:7-19
Message by Christ Servant Minister, Craig Caltagirone

Pastor Nova planned to start a new sermon series today titled "Questions to God". Over the next several weeks we will consider "Is the bible Reliable?", "Why Should I go to Church?", "Why is Jesus Special?" and more. Today I will attempt to kick off the series with the question "Who is God?" If you attended the Ash Wednesday service, you had a teaser for the question, from Pastor Nova's message.

I begin by asking you to pause and silently answer – to yourself – "who is God?" Take a few seconds to consider "who is God?" ... Surely if we made the effort to come to church this morning, to arrive on time even after moving the clocks ahead, coming to a WORSHIP service – you must have some answer to the question "who is God?" Who is this we come to worship?

I suspect some of you may have arrived at a one- or two-word descriptive answer. Anyone want to offer a short answer of one or two words?

If you relate today's reading from Holy Scripture, the one-word answer is Love ... the word from our reading. I counted the occurrences of the word "love" ... 22 times in 13 verses.

When something is repeated in Scripture it is usually a good clue to pay attention ... 22 times? ... caused me a bit of fatigue in processing the reading.

Is that repeated word "love" enough to answer our question?

Some of you may still be thinking through your answer to the question. Anyone wishing to share an answer that is just a bit more than two words?

I thought about adding two words to the question making it "who is God to you?" Would that be a valid question? Or is it similar to asking - what is your truth? There is only one truth, not what we want it to be. Not our preference. Truth is truth. Not my truth or your truth.

And God is God. Or am I making an invalid assumption? I am talking God in the context of some of those words we already stated – LOVE, creator, redeemer, life giving, all powerful. ... But can someone worship a God named money? Or pride? Or possessions? Or power? Can we worship a God that has nothing to do with our stated answers ... nothing to do with ... LOVE?


Who is God?

I cannot recall how I first came to consider the existence of God. As a young child I am certain the thoughts first came from my parents. But I think my early comprehension was more of a fear of God than a love and worship of God.

And through the years of my life, there were some moments of questioning the existence of God. The inquisitive or scientific mind wants to question, to look for proof. Or the times when we feel alone, maybe abandoned OR maybe disruptive voices from classmates, co-workers, or even friends with doubts or disbelief. Oh, that's when I need to pray the verse from the Gospel of Mark ... "Lord I believe, help me in my unbelief."

I believe, God reveals Himself to those who truly seek Him. Might not be visible, might not be conclusive all at once, may develop, like a Polaroid picture – over time.

Two-way benefits

"When you do nothing, you feel overwhelmed and powerless," observed Connecticut politician Pauline Keezer. "But when you get involved, you feel the sense of hope and accomplishment that comes from knowing you are working to make things better." Indeed, it's impossible to shine light in someone else's life without lighting up your own.

We might think being generous toward another with our time or possessions leaves us with less. But as Jesus said, "Whoever loses their life for my sake will find it" (Matthew 10:39, NIV). How common it is that when we minister to others in Christ's name, we find we have also — or perhaps even more so — received ministry. This is the miracle of God's love at work.

For us with the label "Christian", our spiritual journey is travelled with FAITH and as often pointed out, if God and God's ways were all understood by us, if everything was proven to our satisfaction – there would be no need for faith, would there? No need for faith.

But have we answered the question, "who is God?"

When we meet another person, we may want to know "who are you?" We may ask questions. Or if we want to be known by someone, we share personal information about ourselves. When interviewed for employment, the employer wants to know "who are you?" And when we contemplate our spirituality, we may ask God, "who are You?"

Many books have been printed on the subject. Sermons written and delivered, Podcasts, YouTube videos, social media platforms ... all can be found to join in the conversation.

But what about the one book, the one source where we can go for answers? For God to answer the question! The Holy Bible holds many answers – maybe that is where you arrived at some of your descriptive words this morning.

For me, some of the words may create further questions or maybe even contribute to confusion. From the Book of Exodus, you may remember God saying to Moses, "I am who I am". Does that one help you?

Other verses provide great clarity. Words from the prophet Malachi (3:6) *I the Lord do not change*. I find those words to be helpful.

From the 18th Psalm: "For who is God, but the Lord? And who is a rock, except our God?"

Chapter 2 of the prophet Joel: "Return to the Lord your God, for he is gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and abounding in ... love.

To the New Testament and the very first word in the Gospel of John: *In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.*

4th chapter of John tells us God is spirit. 1st Corinthians God is faithful. 1st John God is light.

Sometimes we may think WE are God or wish to have the power of God. Or we seek a substitute for God, maybe money, status, or maybe even a political leader.

And then I am humbled and corrected when reading Isaiah 45 "I am the LORD, and there is no other; apart from me there is no God." Apart from me there is no God. This is the verse that helps us arrive at the phrase "you are God, and I am not".

Isaiah 55 also reads, "My thoughts are nothing like your thoughts," says the Lord. "And my ways are far beyond anything you could imagine.

I may be overloading you with so many verses, but how better to answer our question than to have the Word of God tell us, Who God Is?

Those who claim the label "Christian", recognize that as a community of believers, we are a group whose origin began by living differently, born of love ... and characterized by love. From the book of Acts Chapter 4:

³² All the believers were one in heart and mind. No one claimed that any of their possessions was their own, but they shared everything they had.There were no needy persons among them. For from time to time those who owned land or houses sold them, brought the money from the sales ³⁵ and put it at the apostles' feet, and it was distributed to anyone who had need.

Did you catch those last 6 words? "Distributed to anyone who had need." No mention of who had the ability to pay. No negotiation for how much could be paid back. No question of what you can do for me? "It was distributed to anyone who had need." Sound unrealistic?

Two thousand years later, we continue to claim the name "Christian", professing to be followers of Jesus and yet I hear many speak of fear. I hear repeated tales of people who "like Jesus", but not so much the church when viewing the evidence presented in this world – our world. Hear again verse 18 from the lesson Andrew read for us this morning,

18 There is no fear in love. But perfect love drives out fear. And we conclude with our final verse, 19 We love because He first loved us.

So have we answered the question with any degree of satisfaction, who is God? I suspect even those who have an answer, also have a desire to know God more intimately, to add to the answer. If that is you, hear the words of Matthew 6, verse 33 "But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness." Seek Him first! Not just for these moments this morning but start every day seeking Him and continue that pursuit throughout your days.

We have entered another season of Lent; a season that brings hope for all, reflection for many, sacrifice for some. Perhaps this Lenten season can be a season beyond something we give up, maybe a season to give – sharing the hopes and promises of God, God who is ... Love. AMEN!
